This is a guide for researchers and family historians on the types of school records most commonly held in archives. It describes the information held in the records and how to access them.

The key year to be aware of for school records is 1872. The Education (Scotland) Act 1872 marked a significant change in the management of schools in Scotland. Here is a summary of the differences before and after 1872:

Before 1872

- Schools were run by the church, the burgh council or by charitable organisations
- There were also private fee-paying schools and private tutors for the wealthy
- Few records of these schools survive and those that do are usually minute books relating to the running of the schools which don't mention individual pupils

After 1872

- Schools were run by School Boards and funded by local rates and by pupil fees
- School Boards had a statutory obligation to provide education for all children aged 5 to 13 (the leaving age was raised to 14 in 1901)
- More of these records survive and they are more likely to mention individual pupils

Types of school records

Admission registers

- Includes the pupil's name, date of birth, date of enrolment, and the name and address of their parent/guardian
- May list the previous school attended, or the reason for leaving this school such as 'gone to America', 'needed at home', or 'to Academy'

Log books

- Kept by the head teacher as a daily log of events, often mention disease epidemics, bad weather, or any local events which may affect school attendance
- Most don't mention individual pupils although occasionally they may list names such as school prize winners
- Record staff absences and life events such as family bereavements or weddings which can be useful if you are researching a teacher

School Board/Management Committee minutes

- Meetings about the building and maintenance of schools, staffing, and the attendance of pupils
- Helpful for identifying the names of all the schools in a local area
- Usually these are not indexed

Photographs and publications

- Official class photographs
- Handbooks
- School magazines

Some schools still hold their own archives, but most have transferred them into the care of the local council archives service. You can find out where the archives of a school are held by checking The National Archives 'Discovery' database on their website <http://discovery.nationalarchives.gov.uk/>

Access to school records

School records are essential for documenting the history of schools and their communities. However, they often include personal information about individuals who may still be alive. As a result, the Archive Service must take the Data Protection Act into account when managing these records.

Admission registers are closed to the public for 100 years, and log books for 30 to 75 years, depending on their contents. In certain situations, an archivist can access information from a closed record on your behalf. Please contact us for more information.

History of school management

1873 to 1919 - Parish School Boards reporting to the Scottish Board of Education e.g. Campsie Parish School Board

1919 to 1930 - School Management Committees overseen by local Education Authorities e.g. Kirkintilloch School Management Committee

1930 to 1975 - Education Committees set up by county councils e.g. Dunbarton County Education Committee

1975 to 1996 - Regional councils e.g. Strathclyde Regional Council

1996 to date - Local authorities responsible for education and the management of schools e.g. East Dunbartonshire Council
