1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this report is to advise the board of the financial position and key performance areas for the Trust for period ended 31st March 2024. (Quarter 4)

Libraries - combined visits in person and digital usage

2.1.2 Bearsden Library Closure

Bearsden Library continues to be closed, for safety reasons, following the discovery of Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RACC). To support Bearsden users, the service has significantly increased opening hours at nearby Westerton Library. Footfall and issues have increased significantly at both Westerton and Milngavie libraries, since the closure of Bearsden. Comparing Q4 this year with Q4 last year; Westerton library has seen an increase of 104% in footfall and a 111% increase in issues, while Milngavie library has seen an increase of 29% in footfall and a 28% increase in the number of books issued.

2.1.3 Funded Project

The service secured funding from the Scottish Government Climate Engagement Fund, administered by the Scottish Libraries & Information Council (SLIC), to participate in 'Shelf Life' – a national project bringing libraries together to promote engagement with issues around sustainability. The programme in East Dunbartonshire included Mending & Repair workshops with local crafters and menders Eilidh Weir and Joanna Craig; and a writers' workshop in Westerton Library with participants writing poetry on nature and climate resilience. The Children & Families team held a Climate Activity with Biodiversity workshops from ZooLab; Thunderbolts and Lightening (an edible insect adventure), and drop-in activities and advice throughout the day. 376 adults and children took part in the activities which was in partnership with Home Energy Scotland, EDVA and the EDC Allotment Officer. SLIC funding of £500 also allowed the service to enhance book stock on the topic of climate change.

2.1.4 Learning & Access

The Learning & Access team worked with partners in Ceartas and delivered a programme with users over four sessions exploring, in depth, the resources and services on offer for older people from the service. This included a library tour, and a workshop on accessing online resources; as well as many conversations about the social history of Ceartas. Parts of the sessions were recorded on audio and video, as a way of documenting the experience, and a film will be shared on social media as a way of extending the offer to other groups.

2.1.5 Annual Book Sale

The service held a highly successful book sale in Kirkintilloch Town Hall which generated income of £890. Books are sold for a token amount of 3 for £1, and the sale allows the service to responsibly dispose of redundant stock, which is no longer circulating on

shelves. The event was also a good opportunity to inform the general public about the breadth of free services available to library members in East Dunbartonshire.

2.2.2. Continued Engagement with Online Collections

Promotion of the online collections catalogue has seen a considerable increase in digital usage when compared with the same period last year, although falling short of the actual target for 2023/24. The online collections pages received a record 3,499 interactions during period 10. New collections are continually added and promoted through the EDLC Instagram, face book and Heritage & Arts mailing lists, drawing in new audiences.

New art work collections have been added to the Art UK catalogue and online shop, which can generate income from the online sale of prints of East Dunbartonshire collections. This new initiative is seeing a growing number of visitors to the site and has potential for a new income stream.

In period 11 the digital figure took a dip. This is largely due to an issue with the new Collections catalogue URL, which had stopped working, resulting in the catalogue being inaccessible for a large part of the reporting period.

2.2.3 School Visits to the Auld Kirk Museum

During quarter 4, the Auld Kirk Museum welcomed 3 classes from Holy Family Primary, who were exploring 'Victorians' and 'Castles' as school topics. Staff, In consultation with the school, designed a series of activities based on what the children had been taught in class. One group took part in a castle word hunt followed by a discussion about what Kirkintilloch would have been like in Medieval times and they created a fairytale relating to Kirkintilloch Castle. Staff used handling collections, costumes, images and art work to bring the heritage stories to life. This was a very successful return of school visits, and Holy Family Primary has already made plans to return, with new pupils, next academic year.

2.2.4 Art Classes

The Arts programme saw excellent engagement during Q4, with 123 single engagements in pottery classes and 179 single engagements in children's Saturday classes. The programme continues to grow, responding to demand, while offering a 35% concession for those who qualify.

2.2.5 Exhibitions

The service supported 2 artist exhibitions which explored themes of the environment. This is in response to service ambitions to reduce our carbon footprint and educate visitors about global environmental concerns through cultural engagement.

2.3 Active Schools Staffing

2.3.1 The AS team have had a successful Term 2 (January- March), with a full complement of staff in place and the submission of Term 2 Mysport data to Sportscotland by April. The results of the data will be released within the coming month and will provide an overview of work achieved so far.

Term 1 data is has been analysed and shows a positive start to this academic year when compared to the previous two years. A snapshot of this data is shown below:


As of January 2024, there were 3896 pupils participating in extra-curricular sport and physical activity across primary, secondary and ASN schools within East Dunbartonshire, and 46% of those participating were female.


Total number of sessions- Term 1

Sessions are calculated by the number of times a block of activity takes place e.g. a six-week block of netball would equate to six sessions.

There has been an increase of 18% in number of sessions from 2022-23 to 2023-24.

An increase in sessions indicates an increase in the amount of activity available across schools.





Total number of blocks- Term 1

Blocks are calculated by adding the number activities that took place regardless of sessions e.g. a 12-week block of basketball would count as one block.

There has been an increase of 20% in blocks from 2022-23 to 2023-24.

An increase in blocks shows an increase in opportunities within ED.


2.3.2 Volunteers

The Active Schools team supports a network of volunteers who are vital in the delivery of sport and physical activity within our schools and communities, including:

- Teachers/school staff.
- Family members.
- Young Leaders.
- Students.
- Coaches/Instructors

The AS team provide two training programmes, for volunteers and for young leaders (14+) within ED Secondary Schools, with a range of sports specific and generic coaching courses. The cost of all training is covered by AS in return for volunteer delivery within a school community. Courses are open to any volunteer or young leader interested in delivering extra-curricular sessions in schools.

The below graph shows the total number of deliverers, broken down by paid and voluntary, for term 1 and compares that over the last three years.




There has been a 22% increase in voluntary deliverers from 2022 to 2023, while paid deliverers has remained static. This is a positive picture, which we hope to see continue throughout the academic year.

2.4 Sports Development.

2.4.1 Overview of Service Delivery.

Term time class numbers increased by over 12% this quarter to a high of 3,253, largely due to the reintroduction of football at the new sports dome in the Allander along with the expansion of the Learn to Swim programme.

Key Achievements / Areas of Focus

Android tablets are now fully operational for registers across all sports and for progression through the levels in the Learn to Swim programme.

The primary schools football programme has been growing with coaches delivering to 15 schools and reaching more than 1,600 children each week.

With the opening of the sports dome at the Allander, we have now expanded the free Friday drop-in sessions and are once again running in all 3 leisure centres through our partnership with McDonald's and the Scottish FA.

Coach Education started off the year with two first aid courses and over 24 candidates attending the courses within KLC, these candidates were from local sports clubs. Both courses had local coaches and volunteers allowing the clubs to work towards and/or achieve MOR accreditation.

Our athletes engaged in the Athlete Performance Programme have been performing well with several recent medals in swimming, gymnastics and athletics, selection for squads in hockey and ice hockey, pro-youth contracts in football and movement through into the national pathway for athlete in netball.

Areas requiring Improvement.

• Upgrade to web-based version of OnCourse planned for early 2024 has been delayed by the developer (Fitronics), this has been escalated by XN Leisure as a priority for us.

2.5.1 Leisuredrome

Public Swimming, Health Suite and Club Swimming (Excludes Swimming Development)

The Health Suite has not seen as much usage in 2023/2024 compared to the previous year. It is assumed that this is very much due to the exceptional new facilities at the Allander Leisure Centre just a short drive away. The headcounts for Q4 are still high although down on last year because many of the Allander customers were using the Leisuredrome whilst the Allander was closed. This applies to all headcounts except the gym for Q4.

Facilities

- The passenger lift replacement was awarded to Clyde Valley Lifts with an installation date likely to be June/July 2024. The lift is currently out of order.
- X9 Car park lights/pitch floodlights were fixed and/or upgraded to LED.
- The rain gullies in the main car park were subject to a CCTV survey. It was established that there were extensive blockages. All drains were jetted and cleared.

Huntershill Sports Hub

Staffing and facilities

A feasibility survey was completed by a consultant appointed by EDC Assets to assess and provide indicative costs to develop and enhance the facilities at Huntershill Sports Hub. This was in preparation to apply to the SFA Community Facility Fund to cover at least 50% of the associated development costs. The SFA held a meeting early January 2024 to inform prospective applicants that the £16.1 million had been committed to other projects across Scotland and that no applications would be received at this time.




2.5.2 Allander Leisure Centre

The overall attendance compared to the previous year has been significant in Q4. This has been due to the old Allander closing on 15 January 2023 and no trading until 6 March 2023. Attendance in Q4: 137,627 vs Q3: 111,624


During February attendances including Sports Development reached 2,000 per day. Q4 income £600,713 vs Q3 £475,316, the increase due to seasonal variation and the renewal of memberships in March, which were taken out when the Centre opened in March 2023.



Weekly Use figures show that dryside figures remain strong, as wetside figures begin to slow during the colder weather. This is a standard seasonal trend. Pickleball continues to thrive and is near to overtaking badminton as the most popular racket activity in the Centre.

Staffing

An NHS funded triage post has been added to the Live Active programme and started on 26 January; this will effectively be the first contact for those that have been referred to the Live Active Programme. Staff have performed magnificently to cope with the huge numbers coming through the facility on a daily basis.

Facilities

Both the Car Park and Sports Dome were completed on 19 December. The pre-opening campaign started during week beginning 18 December. Email targeting, Mobile App, Social Media and internal media.

The £1 penalty has significantly increased the number of available spaces for customers to book sessions, reducing the non-show attendance to 6%, from a high of 18% previously.

The entrance access gates are still not operating and connections to cardiovascular equipment in the gym has also caused some issues.

Power cut on the 21 November created issues within the building that in some cases took a week to resolve due to surges from the power being re-instated but also the complete reset of server related equipment.

The official opening of the Sports Drome took place on the 8 January 2024. The Sports Dome has had 10,445 users since opening. There is also a strong Sports Development Football programme with 3 sessions per week. Most local football teams have training session block booked, while still giving ample opportunity for casual 5 a side play.

Professional tennis player Aiden McCue has been training on the tennis court and has been quoted as saying it is one of the best indoor courts in Scotland.

2.5.3 Kirkintilloch Leisure Centre

Wetside

Public Swimming, Health Suite and Club Swimming (Excludes Swimming Development)

The pools and associated areas continue to be a popular activity with the community. Q4 usage is a 5.4% increase in headcount versus 2022/2023 and 24.6% higher than prepandemic Quarter 4 levels in 2019/2020. Annual usage is 5.5% above 2022/23 levels and 10% over 19/20, with the main difference this year over last being the Council's free access scheme and the gradual increase in Swim Club activity. It is worth noting that within the general wetside mainstream swimming usage is downwards. This activity is somewhat price sensitive in Kirkintilloch, plus the autumn and winter period saw a lot of frequent heavy rain, and households without car ownership may be more reluctant to brave the elements and come to the centre.

Outdoor Football

The four five a side courts continue to be reasonably well used at Kirkintilloch. There is now a higher proportion of pitch bookings at the junior rate rather than senior due to reprofiling of demand, with adult bookings static at best, offset by increased bookings by local football clubs for younger children's age groups. Quarter 4 of 23/24 was down 10% on the same period of the previous year, due to the continued extremely wet weather across the period, resulting in higher cancellations and lower casual demand. In comparison to the same quarter in 2019/20 however the usage was up by 39%. Annual usage comparisons are 14.5% above 22/23 year and 44% above the 19/20 annual usage total.

Staffing

Interruption to staffing continuity due mainly to long term sickness absences continued to be a real challenge, albeit reducing over the reporting period as individuals returned to work at the Centre in quarter 4, with key front-facing roles requiring to be covered via supply workers. Additional staff internal movements and departures added to the workload in this respect, with recruitment ongoing to fill permanent and temporary vacancies.

Facilities

Introduction in quarter 4 of new early morning FT30 small group exercise classes held in the Gym extension proved popular with members looking for a more discrete experience in group exercise than Studio classes.

Quotes were obtained for capital works to replace the two pools' liners.

Earlier in the year, new centre wayfinding and graphics signage was installed in the facility complemented by a repaint of all public areas with new corporate colour scheme.

During quarter 3 conversion of the former Conference Room into a new Gym extension took place, with space for floor-based exercise and the use of existing aerobic and functional movement equipment such as rowers, ski-ergs and a self-powered treadmill. This provided an expansion of workout options for Gym users and also enabled improved accommodation of Free Access Scheme expanded member numbers. The Access Scheme had high take up rates at KLC, building on historic work with secondary school-aged children at the KLC Gym.

Key Achievements

Increased overall annual centre usage was 21% higher than 22/23 year and Gym usage grew by 30%. Increases in wet and dry side usage, particularly dry side, and continued growth in Gym usage. The new Gym extension which opened in quarter 3 of 22/23 has helped facilitate growth and provide a better-quality customer experience.

The Centre had a good blend of events taking place this year. Two Duathlon events were held by Glasgow Triathlon Club, Springburn Harriers held two schools' cross-country championships, the annual Neil McCover Half Marathon ran once again as did the Kirkintilloch Gala Week, and the Nicola Benedetti Music Foundation schools' event was hosted in partnership with EDC.

Areas Requiring Improvement

Planning for beyond the Free Access Scheme's end point to retain as many secondary school aged Gym members as possible as independently paid members via the transitional offer to those leaving school by August 2024 and those younger children who would benefit from the Gym experience.






